Impact Analysis – Building the General Practice Workforce to Strengthen Medicare – Second Pass Final Assessment

I am writing in relation to the attached Impact Analysis (IA) prepared for *Building the General Practice Workforce to Strengthen Medicare*.

I am satisfied that the IA addresses the concerns raised in your letter of 6 January 2025. Specifically, the following further information has been added to strengthen the IA:

- Additional information on the causational factors that are driving a projected GP shortage in Australia;
- clearer information about why there are no feasible alternatives to government action in this space;
- inclusion of the multi-criteria analysis used to assess the net benefit of the option packages against the policy objectives and impacts for key stakeholders, and identify the option package with the highest net benefit;
- detail on the regulatory burden and regulatory costs of each option and package;
- strengthened evaluation approach, including key decision points after implementation.

The regulatory burden of the preferred package (Package 1) to business, community organisations or individuals is quantified using the Australian Government's *Regulatory Burden Measurement* framework and is provided below.
